Director's Notes

Playwright Jim Leonard Jr.'s fictional town of Gray, Indiana is a close-knit rural community born during the great westward migration and developed by generations of the same families. In his story, a young girl comes of age in the late 1800s among townspeople sustained by faith, hard work, and a sense of shared values.

It is also a difficult time and place: life is ruled by the weather, the soil, and divine providence; every accident, illness, or childbirth courts death. Principles of sanitation are unknown, and modern medical science, in its infancy, is viewed with suspicion. Disease seems to arrive from nowhere and may wipe out whole communities, its unseen causes believed with certainty to be rooted in the spirit. Illness is a punishment from God for moral failing, spread by corruption to the righteous as a test of faith.

Thus, when a mysterious disease comes to Gray, the townspeople experience crisis as new ideas clash with old beliefs.

The strain between knowledge and faith is as old as human history, each new discovery challenging the beliefs that had explained the physical world before. Some – an earth not the center of the universe, round instead of flat – so shake the foundations of belief about reality that they take generations to be accepted as fact rather than heresy... and even then, the next challenge may send painful insight fleeing back into comfortable ignorance. In such times, ambiguity becomes intolerable. Shades of gray are atomized into black and white: good or evil, right or wrong, friend or enemy. Blindness may be mistaken for seeing, and darkness for light.

Anatomy of Gray explores human society in times of crisis: how even the closest community may be fractured by fear and desperation, inviting weakness and ignorance to turn us against one another and drive us to reject evidence in favor of belief. And how such struggles may also spur us to new levels of strength, courage, understanding, and humanity.

Even as it tackles these fundamental issues, this is not at all a grim play, but a celebration of human interaction in all its complexity. At once humorous and painful, fantastical and deeply real, it is a story of loss, love, fear, faith, betrayal, and, finally, forgiveness, growth, and hope. Both critical and affectionate in its view of human nature, this "children's story for adults" emerges with optimism that, even in the darkest times, the human spirit will ultimately once again find the light.

Prof. Rix holds an MFA in Directing from the University of Minnesota and Certificate in Acting and Directing from Sonia Moore's American Stanislavski Theatre.

Professor Robert L. Smith (Scenic and Lighting Design)- has spent thirty-plus years teaching design and designing for academic theatres in New York, Virginia, Maryland, and Washington. Before coming to K. U., Professor Smith designed scenery for Arrow Rock Lyceum Theatre in Missouri, where he designed the set for Tennessee Williams' A Streetcar Named Desire. Other professional credits include designs for New York's AMAS Musical Theatre, The New Dramatists, Westbeth Theatre, Syracuse Stage (formally known as the Syracuse Repertory Theatre), the Arkansas Repertory Theatre, A Contemporary Theatre, Theatre Center Philadelphia, the Jersey Lyric Opera, and the New Jersey Ballet. K. U. Mainstage credits include Rhinoceros, The Servant of Two Masters, Olympus on My Mind, Moon Over Buffalo, Dancing at Lughnasa, The Hot I Baltimore, The Seagull, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, Baby with the Bathwater, Iphigeneia at Aulis, Arms and the Man, The Threepenny Opera, Picnic, The Comedy of Errors, She Stoops to Conquer, Italian American Reconciliation, Lucky Stiff, R. U. R. (Rossum's Universal Robots), and The Children's Hour.

Professor Charles E. Chapman (Costume Design)- has more that 250 productions to his credit as a scenic, lighting or costume designer, director or performer, including professional children's opera and academic theatre. He joins KU's design faculty after a two year stint as Artist in Residence at Washington University in Saint Louis and previous faculty appointments across the country including Millikin, Valparaiso and head of theatre at Gonzaga. He has his MFA from Southern Illinois University and a BA in theatre from Wentworth Institute. Recent design credits include lighting for House of Desires, Much Ado About Nothing, Violet, Kokoshka, and Hickory Dickory for Washington University, and scenic designs for A Little Night Music, Bastien and Bastienne, Dido and Aeneas, Secret Garden, and Damn Yankees for Millikin. Charlie and his wife Casey are painters, miniaturists and bag pipers and share their home with two very tolerant cats.

Austin Davidheiser (Technical Director)- Austin has been a production manager, technical director, and master electrician, as well as a freelance designer and technician, for various theaters, events companies, and colleges in the Philadelphia area. In the summers, he is the Technical Director/Production Manager for the Pennsylvania Governor's School for the Arts, an intensive interdisciplinary arts program for gifted high school students. His recent design credits include She Stoops to Conquer, Italian American Reconciliation, Lucky Stiff, R. U. R. (Rossum's Universal Robots), and The Children's Hour at KU, as well as Laundry and Bourbon/Lone Star at Camden County College, Disengaged at Ohio University, and Pipeline [sets] for the PGSA Dance Concert.

Becky Malkemes (Stage Manager)- Becky is a fourth year theatre major. She has previously Assistant Stage Managed and also Stage Managed for Kutztown's Sunshine Players and is their current secretary. She is currently an assistant in the costume shop here at Kutztown also.
