Director's Notes

High school is hell. How many of us don't remember it that way, at least partly? Peer pressure, bullying, and devastating social consequences from even small missteps are familiar to virtually anyone who has reached the age of eighteen. The struggle of emerging identity against the drive to be accepted is nothing new. In today's world, though, more than ever before it can become literally a matter of life and death.

In *Dog Sees God*, playwright Bert V. Royal reimagines characters from the long-beloved *Peanuts* comic strip as high school students struggling to find themselves in a landscape rife with family problems, drug and alcohol abuse, and a broad spectrum of sexual activity, with the threat of violence always simmering under the surface. As in the comic strip, most often the characters fail, pick themselves up, and try the same thing all over again hoping for a different result; out of recognition, we laugh at their efforts and even their pain. They're just old enough now that, unlike in the comic strip, a few are compelled to break the cycle forever, however they can.

Did I mention that it's a comedy? Not the traditional happy-ending comedy (though that's there, too, if in tremulous tentative form), but postmodern dark comedy, a product of our age. Dark comedy emerged in the last century as a device to frame unhappy events in an ironic context, proposing that to laugh is the only way to survive looking at them directly. The postmodern style of playwriting reflects the fracturing effects of our industrial-technological era by freely combining elements of varied forms and styles, from high culture to popular entertainments. Imagine Charlie Brown and the gang on acid living out classical Greek tragedy in South Park, and you have a hint of the social satire urging toward spiritual truth that is this play.

Dog Sees God breaks new ground for KU Theatre. The choice to produce it was driven by students, whose passion for the script brought it to my attention. The action and language are more raw and potentially challenging than anything before presented on our stage. The issues engaged prompted scheduling aftershow audience talkbacks and listing support resources in the program. (See the last few pages, and feel free to come back for a talkback even if you're not seeing one of those performances.)

It's still a comedy. And a tragedy. From the first rehearsal to the moment you're reading this note, we've laughed and wept and gasped our way through this funhouse ride. We hope you will, too!

Who's Who in the Cast

Taylor Clark (Matt) Taylor is a Communications Studies major and is excited to be back on the KU main stage for his third performance. His other roles include: "The Officer" in *Tartuffe* and "The Spartan Envoy" in *Lysistrata*. Taylor is the President of the Spotlight Players.

Erin Dixon (CB's Sister) Erin is a junior Theatre major & Communications Studies minor in her fifth KUTheatre production. She was seen last year as "Madame Pernelle" in *Tartuffe* and "Myrrhine" in *Lysistrata*. Becoming a family with these warmhearted, beautiful artists has been unforgettable.

Last summer Eric and fellow castmate Brandon starred in an independent film that is being submitted to film festivals worldwide.

Tim Gulley (Van). is honored to be acting in his fifth show here at Kutztown University. Tim's major is Early childhood Elementary Education. He has enjoyed every show he has been in and is extremely honored to be apart of this wonderful piece of art.

Artistic and Production Staff

Professor Roxane Rix (Director) has taught acting and directing at Kutztown since 2001. Her more recent KU directing credits include Tartuffe, Fuddy Meers, The Lower Depths, As You Like It, and the musical Lucky Stiff, which was selected for performance at the Region II Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival. Prof. Rix is best known for her work with Alba Emoting, a new technique to help actors gain emotional freedom (for which she also maintains the website www.albaemotingna.org). Prof. Rix holds an MFA in Directing from the University of Minnesota and Certificate in Acting and Directing from Sonia Moore's American Stanislavski Theatre.

Professor Robert Lewis Smith (Scenic and Lighting Designer) has spent forty-plus years designing for academic theatres and teaching Theatre Design, Theatre Production, and Theatre History in New Jersey, New York, Virginia, Maryland, Missouri, and Washington. Professional credits include designs for New York's AMAS Musical Theatre, The New Dramatists, Westbeth Theatre, Syracuse Stage (formally known as the Syracuse Repertory Theatre), the Arkansas Repertory Theatre, A Contemporary Theatre, Theatre Center Philadelphia, the Jersey Lyric Opera, New Jersey Ballet, and Arrow Rock Lyceum Theatre. Some recent KU Mainstage credits include scenery and/or lights for Iphigeneia at Aulis (S & L), Arms and the Man (S & L), The Threepenny Opera (S & L), Picnic (S & L), She Stoops to Conquer (S), Italian American Reconciliation (S), Lucky Stiff (S), Hay Fever (S), Anatomy of Grey (S & L), The Little Shop of Horrors (L), and Crimes of the Heart (L). Professor Smith serves as Associate Editor for Scene Design for Theatre Design and Technology, for which he has written articles on various topics. He has also written entries for several encyclopedias and most recently co-authored the chapter on Oliver Smith in Late & Great: American Designers 1960 - 2010. Here at KU he has just completed a 3-year stint as Department Chair for Speech Communication and Theatre. Professor Smith holds an M.F.A. in Design for the Stage from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts and completed doctoral course work in Theatre History, Dramatic Literature, Dramatic Criticism, and Art History at University of Missouri-Columbia. Professor Smith is an All Categories member (scenery, lights, costumes, and scenic painting) of United Scenic Artists (LU 829), the organization for professional stage designers in the United States.

Mary Ann Swords-Green (Costume Designer) has previously designed costumes for Fuddy Meers, Tartuffe, Waiting For Lefty & Sure Thing/The Philadelphia, and Lysistrata at KU. She has also designed costumes for Marywood University, Montgomery Theatre, The Electric Theatre Company, Circle of Stones Ritual Theatre, Media Theatre, Muhlenberg College Dance Department, Desales University Dance Department, Upper Darby Summer Stage, Pennsylvania Youth Theatre, Connecticut Repertory Theatre at the University of Connecticut, and Allenberry Playhouse.
