It is the heroic age: several hundred years before the time of Aeschylus or Pericles. The siege of Troy has been in progress for a decade and from the start Clytaemnestra has never ceased to brood over Agamemnon's sacrifice of their daughter Iphigenia (made to supplicate favorable winds for the Greek armada). She has taken as lover Aegisthus, her husband's enemy and cousin—who has his own score to settle with the king. For it was Aegisthus's father, Thyestes, to whom Agamemnon's father. Atreus, served up his own children to eat at a banquet. The fact that this was done as a reprisal for Thyestes's having seduced his brother's wife made no difference, Aegisthus now feels it incumbant on him to avenge his father and so add the next link in the chain of family crime. The queen too has been waiting. She has posted a watchman on the roof of the royal palace at Argos to tell her the exact moment when the beacons will flash home the news of Troy's downfall, and so the end of the war and the imminent return of her husband.

Orestes, returning from exile, recognizes Electra, his sister, at the tomb of Agamemnon. It seems that Clytaemnestra has been disturbed by a dream. She has sent out her slaves with Electra to offer up libations for the murdered man. After Orestes has made himself known to his sister he conceives a plan of entering the palace with his companion, Pylades, and doing away with his mother and her former paramour, now her husband, Aegisthus.

It is morning: the place is Argos, outside the royal palace, with the tomb of Agamemnon in the background. Orestes and Pylades enter, dressed as travelers. Orestes catches sight of his father's tomb.

Orestes, maddened by the pursuit of his mother's Furies, hurries from land to land trying to escape them. He comes to Apollo's sanctuary at Delphi, hoping that since it was Apollo who instigated him to his act of vengeance Apollo will save him. The Furies meanwhile are asleep in the recesses of the shrine, exhausted by their chase. It is early afternoon: The Pythia, an old woman, emerges into the outer court and lifts up her hands in an attitude of prayer.

The audience should please rise during the prologus and exodus of the chorus. The taking of pictures during the show is not permitted.
