

Director's Notes

The comic masterpieces written by Molière (born Jean-Baptiste Poquelin) are among the most enduring legacies of 17th century France — an ironic triumph, given that dominant religious opinion of the day condemned the very existence of theatre. His plays (*The Misanthrope, The Miser*, and many others) satirizing hypocrisy, pretentiousness and lust (for money, power, or sex) among the upper classes always stirred up controversy. Yet King Louis XIV embraced Molière as one of his favorite playwrights, which, some critics believe, more than once protected the playwright from arrest for his writings.

Tartuffe, like many of Molière's works in the early 1660s, premiered at the King's court in Versailles before being shown publicly — and was instantly banned by the Archbishop of Paris, who took it as an attack on the Church. Molière rewrote it twice in attempt to appease him (once changing the title to *The Imposter*), but it took five years, and the waning of religious influence, for the final version of the play to be performed publicly, to immediate and lasting acclaim.

Molière called *Tartuffe* a satire, not on faith or the faithful, but on the hypocritical use of religion for the purpose of gaining power and wealth. The highly regarded translator, poet Richard Wilbur, calls it a "deep comedy" about a man attempting to keep control of his world by embracing the extreme religious views of a false preacher, the charming and convincing Tartuffe. Wilbur argues that Tartuffe is not so much a hypocrite as, indeed, an imposter: a con artist skilled at taking on any role that helps him to fleece his mark.

At the start of the play, Tartuffe has been clothed, sheltered, and fed by Orgon's family for several weeks, while preaching to them all a severe and "pious" orthodoxy. Orgon and his mother, Pernelle, embrace his precepts, and believe in Tartuffe with a passion that prompts them to demand that everyone in their midst follow him. So convinced of their righteousness that they are impervious to argument or reason, they refuse to look at the very events taking place in front of them until it's too late. (Or, seems to be too late. This is a comedy after all.)

Tartuffe remains a work of bracing timeliness because it renders a human truth — the danger of belief contrary to evidence — through comic poetry that resonates in any age, in varying degrees of darkness or light, seriousness or frivolity. In our own time, when some declare feelings a greater proof of fact than knowledge or evidence, the ability to see that "true and false are not the same" is compromised, inviting the grave danger of putting power over the national household into the hands of a Tartuffe. This brings out some of the darker tones of the play, without, I hope, unduly weighing down the lighter ones. Orgon and Pernelle do eventually see Tartuffe for what he is, and their journey to the truth is marked with merry escapades along the way.

Who's Who in the Cast

David Krater (Orgon) is a senior Theatre major here at Kutztown University and he is thrilled to be back on the Kutztown Mainstage playing the role of Orgon. He was last seen as Richard Fiffle in the spring 2011 production of Fuddy Meers. His past credits include Malvolio from Shakespeare's Twelfth Night, Doc Porter in Crimes of the Heart, Joseph Surface in The School for Scandal, The Fire Chief in The Bald Soprano and 1st officer and soldier in J.B. He is also an active member in Alpha Psi Omega, the National Honors Fraternity in Theater.

Carolyn Kelly (Elmire), a senior Theatre major at Kutztown University, is making her mainstage debut . She has worked in various technical positions for the school's productions of 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee, Twelfth Night, Crimes of the Heart, As You Like It and Little Shop of Horrors. Carolyn was privileged to spend a semester in England at Kingston University of London where she studied Shakespeare and Commedia del Arte. Carolyn is very excited to be a part of this production of Tartuffe.

Artistic and Production Staff

Professor Roxane Rix (Director) has taught acting and directing at Kutztown since the fall of 2001. Among her KU directing credits are last spring's Fuddy Meers; her KU productions of The Lower Depths, The Threepenny Opera, Picnic, RUR, Anatomy of Gray, and As You Like It each won awards for directing, design, and/or ensemble acting, and the 2006 musical Lucky Stiff was selected for presentation at the Region II Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival. Active in regional and national theatre organizations, Prof. Rix is best known across the country and in many parts of the world for her courses, workshops, and publications on Alba Emoting, a new technique to help actors gain emotional freedom (for which she also maintains the website www.albaemotingna.org). Prof. Rix holds an MFA in Directing from the University of Minnesota and Certificate in Acting and Directing from Sonia Moore's American Stanislavski Theatre.


Professor Robert Lewis Smith (Scenic and Light Design) has spent forty-plus years designing for academic theatres and teaching Theatre Design, Theatre Production, and Theatre History in New Jersey, New York, Virginia, Maryland, Missouri, and Washington. Professional credits include designs for New York's AMAS Musical Theatre, The New Dramatists, Westbeth Theatre, Syracuse Stage (formally known as the Syracuse Repertory Theatre), the Arkansas Repertory Theatre, A Contemporary Theatre, Theatre Center Philadelphia, the Jersey Lyric Opera, New Jersey Ballet, and Arrow Rock Lyceum Theatre. Some recent KU Mainstage credits include scenery and/or lights for Iphigeneia at Aulis (S & L), Arms and the Man (S & L), The Threepenny Opera (S & L), Picnic (S & L), She Stoops to Conquer (S), Italian American Reconciliation (S), Lucky Stiff (S), Hay Fever (S), Anatomy of Grey (S & L), The Little Shop of Horrors (L), and Crimes of the Heart (L). Professor Smith serves as Associate Editor for Scene Design for Theatre Design and Technology, for which he has written articles on various topics. He has also written entries for several encyclopedias and most recently co-authored the chapter on Oliver Smith in Late & Great: American Designers 1960 – 2010. Here at KU he has just completed a 3-year stint as Department Chair for Speech Communication and Theatre. Professor Smith holds an M.F.A. in Design for the Stage from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts and completed doctoral course work in Theatre History, Dramatic Literature, Dramatic Criticism, and Art History at University of Missouri—Columbia. Professor Smith is an All Categories member (scenery, lights, costumes, and scenic painting) of United Scenic Artists (LU 829), the organization for professional stage designers in the United States.

Mary Ann Swords-Greene (Costume Designer) Last designed the costumes for Fuddy Meers at Kutztown last Spring semester. She has also designed costumes for Marywood University, Montgomery Theatre, The Electric Theatre Company, Circle of Stones Ritual Theatre, Media Theatre, Muhlenberg College Dance Department, Desales University Dance Department, Upper Darby Summer Stage, Pennsylvania Youth Theatre, Connecticut Opera, Connecticut Repertory Theatre at the University of Connecticut, and Allenberry Playhouse.

He has also been seen in the World premiere of Christina Masciotti's Vision Disturbance, produced at the Yocum Institute for Arts Education and performed the role of The Shoemaker in Primary Stages production of The Elves and the Shoemaker.
