1. "Word Dance" - Everyone

At a party, a group of friends dance, gossip and banter, all in good fun.

2. "The Night the Bed Fell" - Jeff

The First Man remembers an occurence that happened years ago, where one misunderstanding led to chaos at home.

- 3. "Fables for Our Times" "The Wolf at the Door," "The Unicorn in the Garden," and "The Little Girl and the Wolf." The famous Aesop told tales to illustrate moral lessons. James Thurber tells stories with the humor of a practical joker.
- 4. "If Grant Had Been Drinking at Appomatox" Stuart, Jeff and Mike Lee's surrender to Grant at Appomatox Court House ended the Civil War. Taking the legendary eccentricities of Grant, Thurber creates a scene spoofing these historical figures.
- 5. "Casuals of the Keys" Mark and Craig

Peter Williams, a newspaper reporter, discovers a mysterious hermit on a Caribbean island. Time goes by as the hermit tells several stories in which he treats the remarkable as very ordinary. Imagine a mermaid reciting poetry or a bird spending money!

6. "The Macbeth Murder Mystery" - Mike and Marlene

An American tourist comes up with a curiously individual interpretation of **Macbeth**.

7. "Gentlemen Shoppers" - Craig, Peggy, Lisa, Jeff and Mark

When gentlemen have had too much to drink and, at the same time, are trying to buy Christmas presents for their wives, slapstick humor results.

"The Last Flower" - Peggy

On the eve of World War II, Thurber wrote this parable. In the midst of the cycles of destruction, hope is still possible.

2. "File and Forget" - Michael, Jill, Terri, Marlene, Lisa, Craig, and Jeff

Open triumph is not the usual destiny of a Thurber male certainly not when the enemy is a book club. Do you know anyone who has ever outwitted one?

3. "Mr. Preble Gets Rid of His Wife" - Mark, Peggy and Terri

Mr. Preble is drawn from Thurber's "John Monroe" stories. Neither he nor his wife are heroic. Yet we tend to sympathize more with the bumbling behavior of the husband than with the brusque efficiency of the wife.

4. "Take Her Up Tenderly" - Stuart, Terri and Lisa

Three young people decide to rewrite poems they have studied in English classes.


5. "The Secret Life of Walter Mitty" - Everyone
